Abstract. This book assesses the worth of arguments for and against the existence of God. Evidence confirms (makes more probable) an explanatory hypothesis in so far as (1) given the hypothesis the evidence is to be expected, that is the hypothesis makes the evidence probable, (2) the evidence is not otherwise to be expected, (3)

the hypothesis is simple, and (4) it fits with background knowledge (i.e., knowledge about how things behave in neighbouring fields of enquiry).

The most general phenomenon that provides evidence for the existence of God is the existence of the physical universe for as long as it has existed (whether a finite time or, if it has no beginning, an infinite time). This is something evidently inexplicable by science.

The Existence of God Richard Swinburne

Swinburne posits the existence of God as a "brute fact" that simply does not have an explanation. Take it or leave it! It's his hypothesis and he can frame it any way he pleases. God is a person (and only one person), and as a person he has intentions, beliefs, and basic powers (p. 97).

The theism supported by Swinburne is the hypothesis that there is one God, who is the creator of the cosmos. According to Swinburne, good God, though having the power to benefit or to harm us, would provide significant freedom and responsibility to his creation, rather than expel evil (Swinburne 262).

Richard Swinburne's Arguments on Why God Allows Evil

The existence and regular behaviour of material objects provide good evidence for the existence of God, says Swinburne. God made an orderly world to make it suitable as a theatre for humans. He (uncritically) accepts Paley's argument from design: "This analogy of animals to complex machines seems to me correct, and its conclusion justified."
